In writing, we have continued writing short reports on a range of topics. We haven't dug into anything in great death but have been practicing the formatting and selecting information to be included. The children have all been assigned a NZ native bird that we will begin researching in week 11. I will also send home what we will be looking for incase you want to do some research together over the holidays. We won't begin our reports until the beginning of term 3. Remember to keep sending in their laptops every day as we are using our laptops to find information on our inquiry – Magnificent Manu.

Reading comprehension will continue to be our focus until the end of the term. I have just finished testing all the children and am very impressed with their reading and the strategies that they were able to use to decode words or to find meaning in the text. While I don't send books home to read every night, there are books in the classroom if you want your child to bring some home as well as our weekly visit to the library. The expectation is that they read for a minimum of 15-20 minutes per night on week days.

I hope you are all looking forward to the holidays and I hope you manage to get a bit of a break from the school day routines.

In Room 4, we have finished up our volcano report writing, and the students have taught me so much about our amazing New Zealand volcanoes! We are now working on using descriptive words and similes to help us build tension in our spooky stories.

In math, we are moving into multiplication strategies.

In reading, our next focus will be on point of view and being able to identify the difference between the narrator's thoughts and the characters' thoughts.

We have also been learning about the Canterbury earthquake and how buildings can be built in a way that minimizes damage in an earthquake, please see the photos, these structures were shaken on a jelly plate to see how we went creating strong buildings.

The end of term is creeping up on us, and we have lots to get through; the time is going to fly by!














On Wednesday 20th March Room 5 along with other classes were blessed to be given an interactive lesson from Legend Unleashed Dinosaurs Aotearoa where they showed us heaps of preserved dinosaur fossils. Each student was given a small bag of sand with miniature gems and crystals mixed into it. They were then given a gold sieve and went to sit by a large bucket of water in groups of 4-5. Eventually each student ended up with a small bag full of miniature shiny crystals and gems to take home. At the end of the lesson everybody was given the opportunity to look around and feel all the displays. After the lesson every child in the class got to take a replica of a dinosaur foot made out of plasticine to paint, and their bag of gems to take home.



On Monday 25th March room 5 began to write about their individual interest projects which is where they inform the other classrooms about their passions, some of these interests include: Skiing, terrariums, art, hunting etc. We have been working on these interest projects for a few days and the students are very excited to show off their work to the other classes.

Room 6 students are super excited about showing off their clowns at this Friday's assembly.


Darren Dinosaur and his exhibition was outstanding. The students had lots of discussion and willingly shared their new learning.
