

In Science the students having been learning about seed germination, photosynthesis and the carbon cycle. They have grown seedlings that will hopefully, later be planted in the garden. We also tested the ph of our garden soil and used red cabbage as an indicator to find out if various liquids were acid or alkaline.

Term 3 has been a busy term for the Room 5 family. The shared teaching in the class has provided the students with a wide range of learning activities.

In mathematics we have been studying *Position and Movement*. What is this you may say? I did too. A quick glance at the textbook and the recognisable terms of *Reflection*, *Transformation and Rotation* appeared.

Great I now know what topics I have to teach. We studied the co-ordinate plain to develop an understanding of the x and y axis and the four quadrants. I am pleased to say the students have all achieved to their respective levels at these mathematical concepts.

Music has consisted of listening activities and music knowledge tasks. The students have studied instruments which have included the clarinet, saxophone and trumpet. We have also looked at the importance music play in film.

After morning break and lunch the students continued the established routine of silent reading. They take this activity seriously all reading chapter books.

I congratulate the room 5 family on the way they made their teachers part of the group this term.



How does our School Ag Day work?

Developing Clever Little Life Savers

The ASB St John in Schools programme aims to develop confident young Kiwi kids who care for the health and wellbeing of their communities. Our sessions deliver positive learning experiences to empower children to prevent injuries and respond to emergencies.

St John is committed to strengthening resilience and improving health and wellbeing in our community and recognise that children of all ages could make a life-saving difference in an emergency.

We visit schools across New Zealand training pre-school, primary and intermediate school-aged children to be clever little lifesavers. The programme is also available in Te Reo for all kura and kohanga reo.

What happens in a typical ASB St John in Schools session?

One of our trained Community Educators, in consultation with the school, plans and delivers an engaging, interactive session. The programme has been developed with expertise from ACC, SafeKids Aotearoa, Civil Defence, CORE Education and St John and supports today's school curriculum. This takes place onsite at the school to a class or group of classes.

Modules on offer within the programme include:

- Responding to an Emergency (Available as Preschool Module through to Year 8)
- Keeping Safe (Year 0-8)
- Clued Up Camper (Year 5-8)

Our sessions are between 45-90 minutes and modules are specifically designed to cater to all different age groups and learning abilities.
